

WELCOME TO CULLENDORE HIGH COUNTRY

Welcome to Cullendore High Country. For the safety and convenience of campers and for legal and insurance purposes we have the following CONDITIONS OF ENTRY.

GENERAL RULES

- It is important to recognise that trees, particularly native trees can lose branches without warning. Set up your campsite to avoid these risks,
- No drones are to be flown on the campgrounds,
- No pets are allowed.

DRIVING

ALL road rules of NSW apply to ALL publicly accessible, private tracks/roads within the state.

This means that these road rules apply on all of the roads on our campgrounds.

WE ARE NOT A 4X4 PARK! DRIVE SEDATELY,

- All vehicles must adhere to our 15km/h speed limit, especially in camp areas,
- All vehicles must stay on our designated tracks,
- All drivers must possess a current driver's license.
- No passengers are to ride on the back of or outside vehicles.

TOILETS

- No chemicals or foreign objects are to be emptied into any septic toilet or system.
- Dump point available on campgrounds.

NOISE

- Noise is to be kept to a minimum (loud music, cracking whips etc. is prohibited)
- No chainsaws or electric saws are to be used,
- Generators are only to be used from 10am to 4pm.

FIRES


- No fires are to be lit during a Total Fire Ban - Gas BBQs will be provided for your use during these times,
- The location of fire pits cannot be changed.

WATER ACTIVITIES

All swimming is carried out in creeks and dams. These areas may contain submerged logs and boulders. Deeper water may be colder below the surface, which could induce cramps

- Always supervise children when swimming.
- * Guests and any other persons who engage in any recreational activity within the meaning of the <u>Civil Liability Act 2002</u> in, on or near the park, need to be aware that the pursuit of such activities may result in harm or personal injury. All persons who engage in any recreational activity do so at their own risk.

We cater for all forms of camping including tents, camper trailers and caravans. The campground is accessible by 2WD and 4WD vehicles.




















We have many kilometres of driving tracks that take you to special areas of our campground, designed to take visitors on sedate and scenic tours.

EMERGENCY EVACUATION

The Emergency Evacuation map is designed to be used in emergency situations, to quickly and safely evacuate the campgrounds. An evacuation will be enacted if a situation arises that places you or your equipment at risk. This will most likely be a bushfire situation.
